Richmond Primary School caters for students from R-6. At the time of this report, the enrolment in 2024 is 361. Richmond Primary School is classified as Category 4 on the Department for Education Index of Educational Disadvantage. At the time of this report, the school population includes 2% Aboriginal students, 17% students with disabilities, 19% students with English as an additional language or dialect (EALD) funded background. Time spent in GC meetings is often after hours and more than just attendance of meetings – there's so much energy and effort that needs to be recognised. Thanks to all who have supported our students and volunteered their time throughout the year.

2024 was a big year at Richmond Primary seeing many learning, sporting, arts and community events re-emerge for our students and families to enjoy. It also marked the delivery of our \$1Million playground upgrade for the students to enjoy. Big thanks to leadership and Jayne Stinson MP for their support in ensuring this project was delivered and catered appropriately for all year levels to enjoy. I'm sure you'll all agree the play areas around the school including the "oval" are the best they've looked in years.

2024 was also another year of facilities focus from leadership seeing continued maintenance, modern storage solutions delivered to most classrooms, acoustic measures put in place to ensure students could listen and hear better in class and we achieved a fantastic milestone in having devices available for every student where needed through upgrades and smart purchasing. We also saw the enclosure of the OSHC canopy making this a more year-round proposition for use. The Governing council reviewed many policies for both OSHC and the school, delivered multiple fundraisers, cooked hundreds of sausages, volunteered many hours throughout the year.

RPS made the news for good reason this year with Richmond achieving number 8 in the state NAPLAN results. A great achievement from our hardworking students and staff. 2024 saw a welcomed return of more community events at the school including Harmony Day and Book Week and the amplification of student voice and agency – this is something the Governing council is eager to build on in 2025.

2024 saw a record number of students participate in the ever-growing School Soccer program with 104 students playing soccer throughout the year – this is nearly a third of the school! A big thankyou to Maree and Tania who organise the program in their own time and to our wonderful parent coaches who guide our students and teams through their matches each weekend. Our Choir worked hard and even did some public performances throughout the year and big congratulations to Rob Cherin for bringing this program to life. We also saw our instrumental program continue however it was disappointing to have their performance cancelled with short notice after they all worked so hard.

Sadly, we farewelled 2 amazing staff Miss Megaw and Miss Poppy who both passed away and will be eternally missed by staff, students and the wider school community. Governing council advocated for a nice plaque and reading chair to keep the memory of Miss Megaw alive and perpetuate her love of reading with the students. We will look to do something similar in 2025 for our beloved Miss Poppy.

Finally, we wish outgoing Principal Graham Slarks all the very best for his retirement and thank him for his contributions to Richmond Primary over the past few years. Graham's passion was to ensure the staff and children had comfortable, bright learning environments and the school's facilities are much improved from the day he arrived, and we have students equipped with laptops/devices which will be his legacy. Governing Council were part of the process to recruit and appoint a new school leader and principal and we are very excited to have appointed Jodie Kingham who brings a wealth of experience to Richmond. Jodie won the role and her passion for supporting her staff, empowering students and bringing community together shone through.

Congratulations to all our students graduating to High School – you're ready for your new challenge! Once again, thank you to all teachers, school leadership, parents, caregivers and students for all your hard work and dedication throughout 2024.

Here's to an even better 2025!




Performance Summary NAPLAN Proficiency









Attendance Comment

In South Australia, all children and young people must be in school from 6 years to 16 years old. They must attend a government or non-government school full time. From age 16 to 17 however, young people must attend school or an approved learning program (such as an apprenticeship, traineeship, accredited course or university). Schools and parents must encourage and support students to come to school every day. Parents and caregivers must make sure their child is enrolled in a school, and attends school all day and everyday it is open, unless a child is sick or has an approved exemption. Teachers and leaders actively follow up when a student misses school, including recording all absences and non-attendance. All schools in South Australia have local attendance procedures governed under the Education and Children's Services Regulations 2020.
