Wynn Vale School caters for students from R-6. At the time of this report, the enrolment in 2023 is 396. Wynn Vale School is classified as Category 6 on the Department for Education Index of Educational Disadvantage. At the time of this report, the school population includes 4% Aboriginal students, 22% students with disabilities, 5% students with English as an additional language or dialect (EALD) funded background, 1% children/young people in care. # **Attendance Comment**

In South Australia, preschool attendance is not compulsory, but it is strongly encouraged. Preschool gives children the best opportunity to develop skills, which prepare them for school. These benefits include establishing positive routines and habits, friendships and connections as well as developing communication, problem-solving and creative skills. All children are entitled to access a preschool program over 4 terms the year before they start school.

In South Australia, all children and young people must be in school from 6 years to 16 years old. They must attend a government or nongovernment school full time. From age 16 to 17 however, young people must attend school or an approved learning program (such as an apprenticeship, traineeship, accredited course or university). Schools and parents must encourage and support students to come to school every day. Parents and caregivers must make sure their child is enrolled in a school, and attends school all day and everyday it is open, unless a child is sick or has an approved exemption. Teachers and leaders actively follow up when a student misses school, including recording all absences and non-attendance. All schools in South Australia have local attendance procedures governed under the Education and Children's Services Regulations 2020.

# **Governing Council Report**

If there was one thing that the Covid years taught us it is that there will always be change and the year 2023 at Wynn Vale school reinforced this.

In term one Mr Fenton informed us that he would be taken on secondment to head office for term two and the school had its first of two acting principals for the year, Mrs Sara Slater. Mr Fenton's secondment extended for another term and Ms Slater had also won the role of principal at Modbury Primary for the remainder of the year, school bringing us our third principal for the year Mr Derek Gallamore. On Mr Fenton's return, in Term 4 he informed us that he had won the principal role at Golden Grove Primary School for 2024 onwards and would be leaving Wynn Vale. Mr Gallamore had also announced he had also won the role of Principal at Keithcot Farm for 2024 onwards. We now welcome Mrs Amanda Browne as our new principal for 2024.

This has been a lesson to live, one of the school's values, resilience.

Despite all the changes at this top level with the support of parents, governing council, leadership, teachers and students the school was still able to function normally and hold some exciting events. Sports Day, Disco, Bookweek Parade, Year Six Graduation, SAPSASA participations, school camps, Children's University, Harmony Day, Reconciliation Week and World Environment Day to name a few. Strong relationships in the school helped us through, this was a lesson in our school value, relationships.

School site improvements moved along although sometimes not as quickly as hoped but new playground designs were finalised, the water leaks under C block dealt with and steps made towards tiling the toilets, painting the games area under shade, the vegetable patches received some love and a we now have something wonderful murals arounds the school.

2024 sees landscaping of the gym and canteen area as a priority and the completion of OSHC playground, line marking and court resurfacing. Considered management and financial stability make this possible.

Thanks to all who contributed to the governing council and sub committees in 2023. Congratulation to all students on their continuing personal improvement.


Wynn Vale School continues to have an enviable reputation and remains a great place for children to learn. Let's work together to keep this reputation intact living the lesson of the school's other value, respect


#### Proportion of agree/strongly agree responses (%)

## Leadership and Decision Making


#### Proportion of agree/strongly agree responses (%)
