### **Context Statement**

Brompton Primary School caters for students from R-6. At the time of this report, the enrolment in 2024 is 179. Brompton Primary School is classified as Category 3 on the Department for Education Index of Educational Disadvantage. At the time of this report, the school population includes 10% Aboriginal students, 12% students with disabilities, 2% students with English as an additional language or dialect (EALD) funded background, 3% children/young people in care. ### **Governing Council Report**

During 2024 the focus at Brompton Primary School remained on sustaining a healthy school culture, one that reflects a covert and overt belief that 'every child can learn.'

Despite starting the school year with a consistent staffing profile some staffing changes occurred during the year. The impact of these changes was minimised as the Australian Curriculum was the reference point of every educator's learning design.

The Governing Council's received notification that the request to sell the land parcel (corner of Baker and Torrens Road) had been declined.

The department's Strategy of Education was showcased during several sessions over the year. The agenda within our school's current Site Improvement Plan continued to be driven whilst layering in the 4 Areas of Impact. The school is looking towards a focus on Equity and Excellence in 2025.

Ensuring good communication between home and school continued to be a focus. Families were provided with information about the most effective and efficient ways to communicate between home and school to gain the knowledge they have about their child's progress.

Congratulations were given to Pana and the OSHC team as they successfully met the National Quality Standards in all areas.

### **Attendance Comment**

In South Australia, all children and young people must be in school from 6 years to 16 years old. They must attend a government or nongovernment school full time. From age 16 to 17 however, young people must attend school or an approved learning program (such as an apprenticeship, traineeship, accredited course or university). Schools and parents must encourage and support students to come to school every day. Parents and caregivers must make sure their child is enrolled in a school, and attends school all day and everyday it is open, unless a child is sick or has an approved exemption. Teachers and leaders actively follow up when a student misses school, including recording all absences and non-attendance. All schools in South Australia have local attendance procedures governed under the Education and Children's Services Regulations 2020.
