




2024 annual report to the Community

Context Statement

Compton Primary School caters for students from R-6. At the time of this report, the enrolment in 2024 is 83. Compton Primary School is classified as Category 5 on the Department for Education Index of Educational Disadvantage. At the time of this report, the school population includes 1% Aboriginal students, 5% students with disabilities, 2% children/young people in care. Governing Council Report

2024 saw a number of changes to roles and responsibilities within the Compton Governing Council; with the treasurer completing her time at the school and the chair unexpectedly stepping down in Term One.

As a result, I was voted in to take over as the chair, with this being my first year as Chair and third year on the council. 2024 saw the school community lose one of the key members of the Compton Primary School staff; Mrs Shirley Roulstone passed away from illness leaving a large hole in the hearts of all who attending the school and had the pleasure of working with and knowing her. As a way to pay tribute to all she had provided the school, the Governing council created a remembrance award which was given to two students (one upper and one lower primary) who demonstrated kindness to others. We agreed to have this continue as a yearly award.

The school commenced taking midyear intakes into Reception as per the changes to the school system, this saw a number of students commence reception in term 3 of 2024; the R/1s adapted well to the changes and welcoming of the new students.

The Fundraising committee took on a new challenge in 2024 hosting a quiz night at the RSL, the event was extremely successful costing little of the council and raising \$1,100 for the committee. Other fundraisers included a schnitzel drive, OK Pie Shop lunches, Casual Day, Purple Day (proceeds go towards charity), school stalls for mother and father's day (organised and run by the student leadership group).

2024 commenced Breakfast Club with volunteers attending in the morning to cook toast and provide breakfast to students, this quickly became a popular activity for students. The council agreed to purchase a new toaster and items of food were donated from local charities.

Compton continued to offer opportunities to the students to participate in including T-Ball, basketball, Questacon incursion, District Sports Day, Cross Country, the Premier's Reading Challenge, attending productions, Anzac day and Remembrance Day.

The council also created a Disney Christmas Float, a number of students and parents got involved and helped the school to win the prize for out-of-town floats and receive a \$250 award from the Mount Gambier Council.

The fundraising committee held an end of school event - Colour Run day and pizza lunch for the students (paid for by the council). This was a successful day with students participating and enjoying their time in the sun!! Further to this, a whole school disco was hosted by the council and held at the Compton Hall, children were provided with glow sticks, fruit boxes and a snack at the 'locked in' event. This went off without a hitch and was highly popular for the students.

Overall, it's been a wonderful year for all involved and we can't wait to see what 2025 brings.







Attendance Comment

In South Australia, all children and young people must be in school from 6 years to 16 years old. They must attend a government or nongovernment school full time. From age 16 to 17 however, young people must attend school or an approved learning program (such as an apprenticeship, traineeship, accredited course or university). Schools and parents must encourage and support students to come to school every day. Parents and caregivers must make sure their child is enrolled in a school, and attends school all day and everyday it is open, unless a child is sick or has an approved exemption. Teachers and leaders actively follow up when a student misses school, including recording all absences and non-attendance. All schools in South Australia have local attendance procedures governed under the Education and Children's Services Regulations 2020.
