Context Statement

Murray Bridge High School caters for students from 7-12. At the time of this report, the enrolment in 2023 is 1253. Murray Bridge High School is classified as Category 2 on the Department for Education Index of Educational Disadvantage. At the time of this report, the school population includes 15% Aboriginal students, 10% students with disabilities, 7% students with English as an additional language or dialect (EALD) funded background, 2% children/young people in care. Governing Council Report

I am amazed at all the things that took place throughout the year from sporting challenges, robotics, musical performances and many more. Some individual things of note were 2022 student Gamze being named as the Rural City of Murray Bridge's Young Citizen of the Year, year 10 student, Leah, being named in an All-Australian netball team after being named as South Australian MVP. What is even more remarkable is she was a late call up to the SA team and was the only public-school representative. Also, another year 10 student, Jamain, had his artwork created as a wrap on one of Adelaide's trams during Reconciliation Week.

It was good to see that some students did volunteering work through the Year 9 @ Work program. They did some work at the RSL clubrooms earlier in the year clearing some of the landscaping around the area then in the last week or so went back and did plantings in those same area. They were also busy at the Jervois Hall and at the Murray Bridge Community Children's Centre where they helped develop a bush garden, which included a yarnning circle for storytelling. As a result of the students work at the RSL club they were invited to participate in the end of the Vietnam War 50-year Anniversary representing the school at that event. I'm sure they have done the school proud. Volunteers are needed in many different areas and these experiences will help them in the future. Our musical students also had many opportunities to display their musical skills both through vocalizing and playing instruments throughout the year. The concert band 1 played at the All-Culture Fest and some of our vocalisers were able to sing with the Australian Girls Choir which would be a once in a lifetime experience. The band, Exit Plan, consisting of Seth, Cooper, Nicholas and Jayden, entered 3 of their original songs in the Triple J Unearthed competition so some students went beyond our local area. Reading through the newsletter highlights also showed how some of the students were thinking outside the normal lesson structure doing things like Lids4Kids where plastic lids were being recycled and kept out of landfill, the year 12 P.A.R.T.Y. program, i.e. Prevent Alcohol and Risk-related Trauma in Youth, the Blue Tree Project which is raising awareness and starting important conversations about mental health and there were others.

Our Aboriginal students have also been busy this year with the launch of the Clontarf Foundation which helps support our younger male Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders to grow and develop leadership skills. SAASTA students participated in many sporting activities and the year 9s did a morning tea after their completion of their Bush Tucker unit inviting the ASETO's, Clontarf and SAASTA teachers along.

The range of subjects offered here at Murray Bridge High School amazes me. You have your normal maths, English and science subjects but then you can add in your agricultural studies, hospitality, and all the vocational training subjects. We all know that we need more construction builders and I believe that this school is helping with that. The Robotics Club is another different pathway of study with the building and programming of the robots. It's all so different to when we went to school, things like the year 8 science class after learning about rocks and minerals was to do some further investigation on mining by mining a fruit cake. I think I would rather have eaten the fruit cake. And I really haven't touched on the many different sporting activities that the students engaged in throughout the year.

I would like to wish the best for the teachers that are leaving us at the end of the year. I believe that there is only a few of you which as an outsider says that this is a good school to work at. Thank you for your service to this school and this community. To the year 12 students, my best wishes to you too as you leave us. Strive for the best for yourself whether that is going on to further study or going into the workforce. No matter what job you will be doing, you will be playing your part in this community.

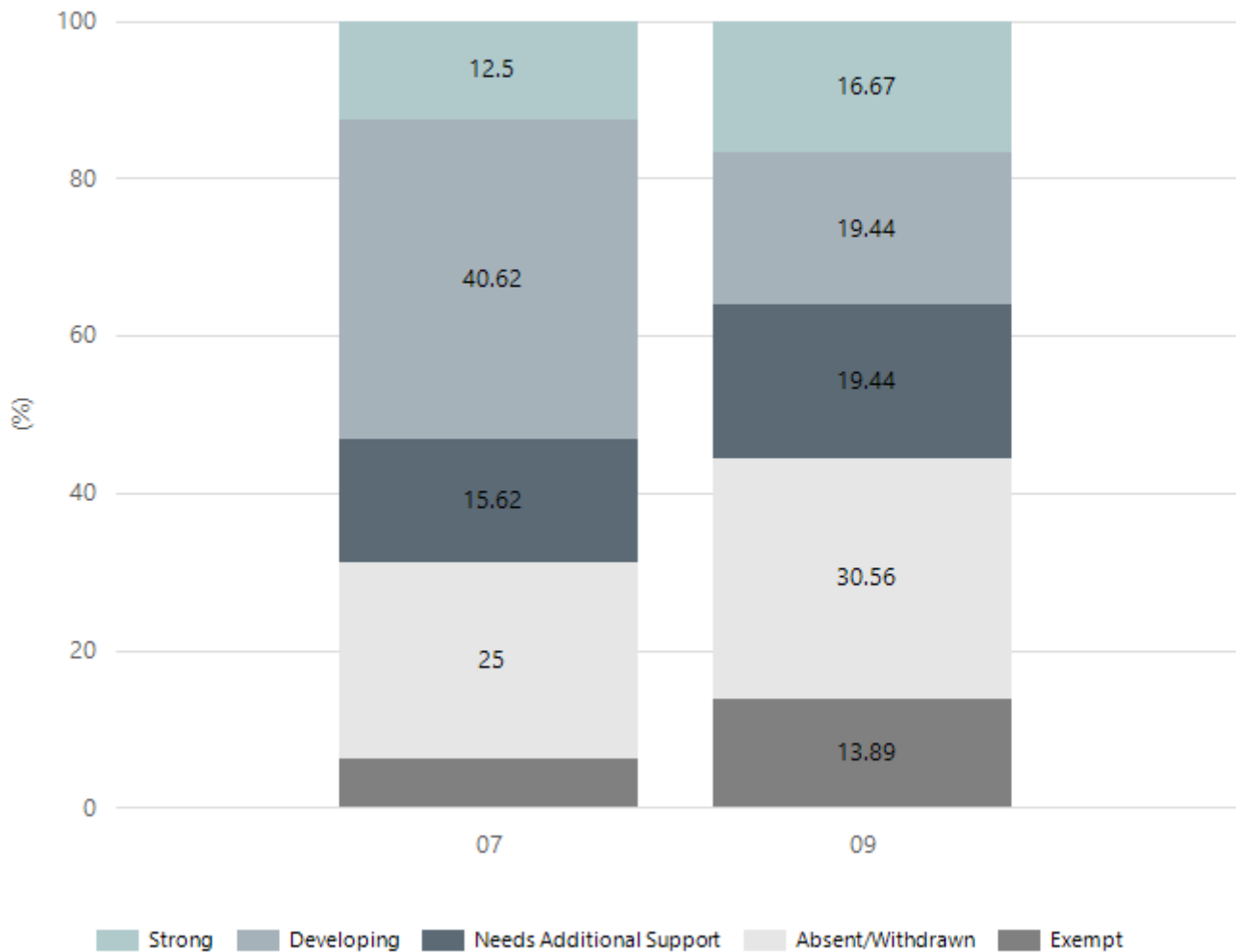

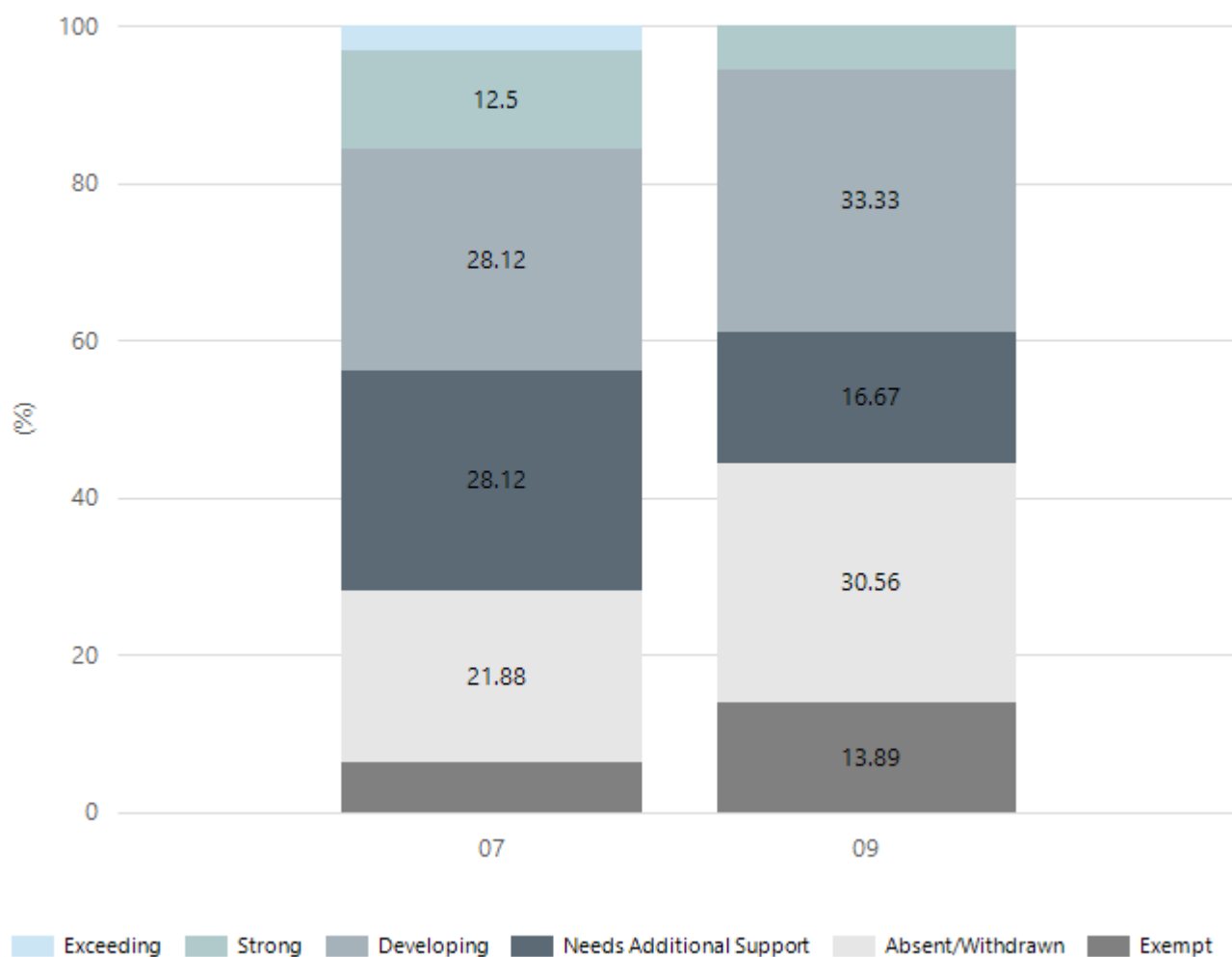

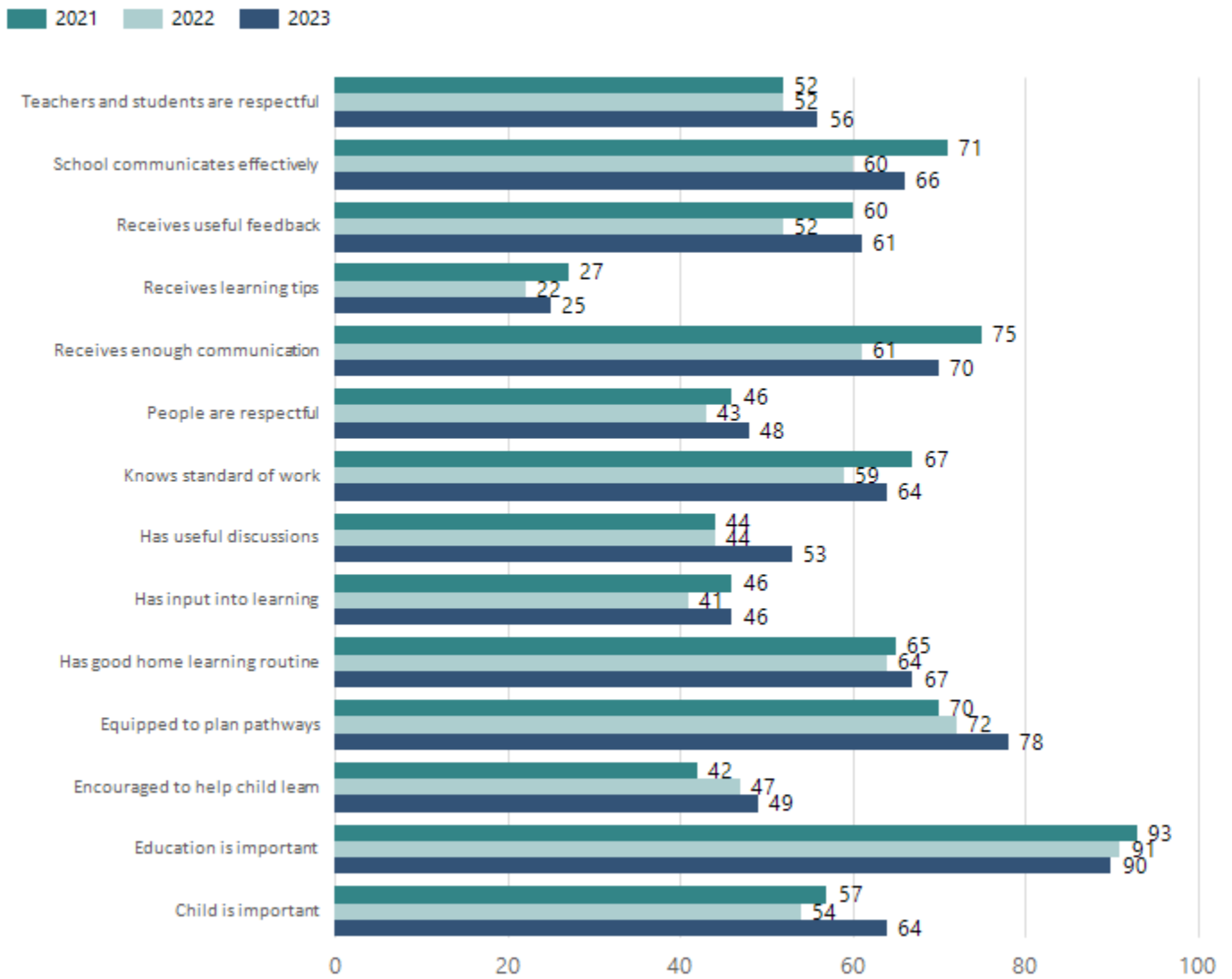

Attendance Comment

In South Australia, all children and young people must be in school from 6 years to 16 years old. They must attend a government or non-government school full time. From age 16 to 17 however, young people must attend school or an approved learning program (such as an apprenticeship, traineeship, accredited course or university). Schools and parents must encourage and support students to come to school every day. Parents and caregivers must make sure their child is enrolled in a school, and attends school all day and everyday it is open, unless a child is sick or has an approved exemption. Teachers and leaders actively follow up when a student misses school, including recording all absences and non-attendance. All schools in South Australia have local attendance procedures governed under the Education and Children's Services Regulations 2020.
