# Context Statement

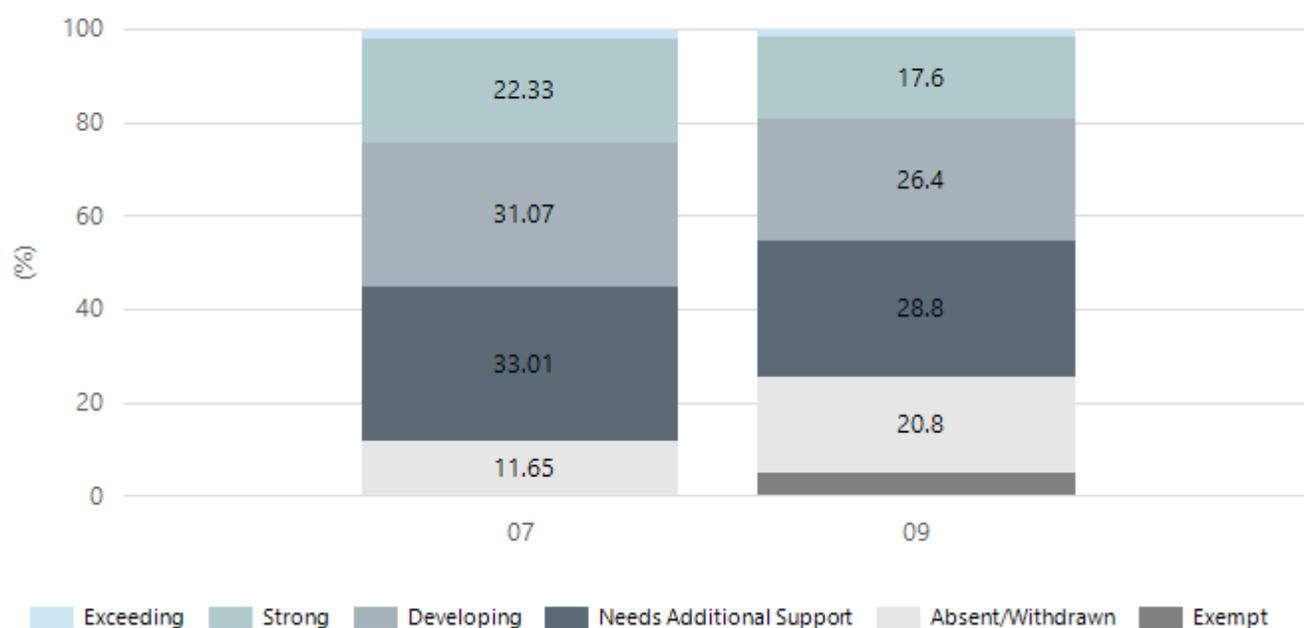
John Pirie Secondary School caters for students from 7-12. At the time of this report, the enrolment in 2023 is 677. John Pirie Secondary School is classified as Category 2 on the Department for Education Index of Educational Disadvantage. At the time of this report, the school population includes 19% Aboriginal students, 11% students with disabilities, 1% students with English as an additional language or dialect (EALD) funded background, 4% children/young people in care. ## Performance Summary

### NAPLAN Proficiency

In 2023, the Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA) - a Commonwealth Independent statutory authority - announced changes to NAPLAN performance reporting. This new way of reporting by ACARA that NAPLAN results from 2023 will not be comparable to previous years. The new approach replaces the previous numerical NAPLAN bands and the national minimum standard.

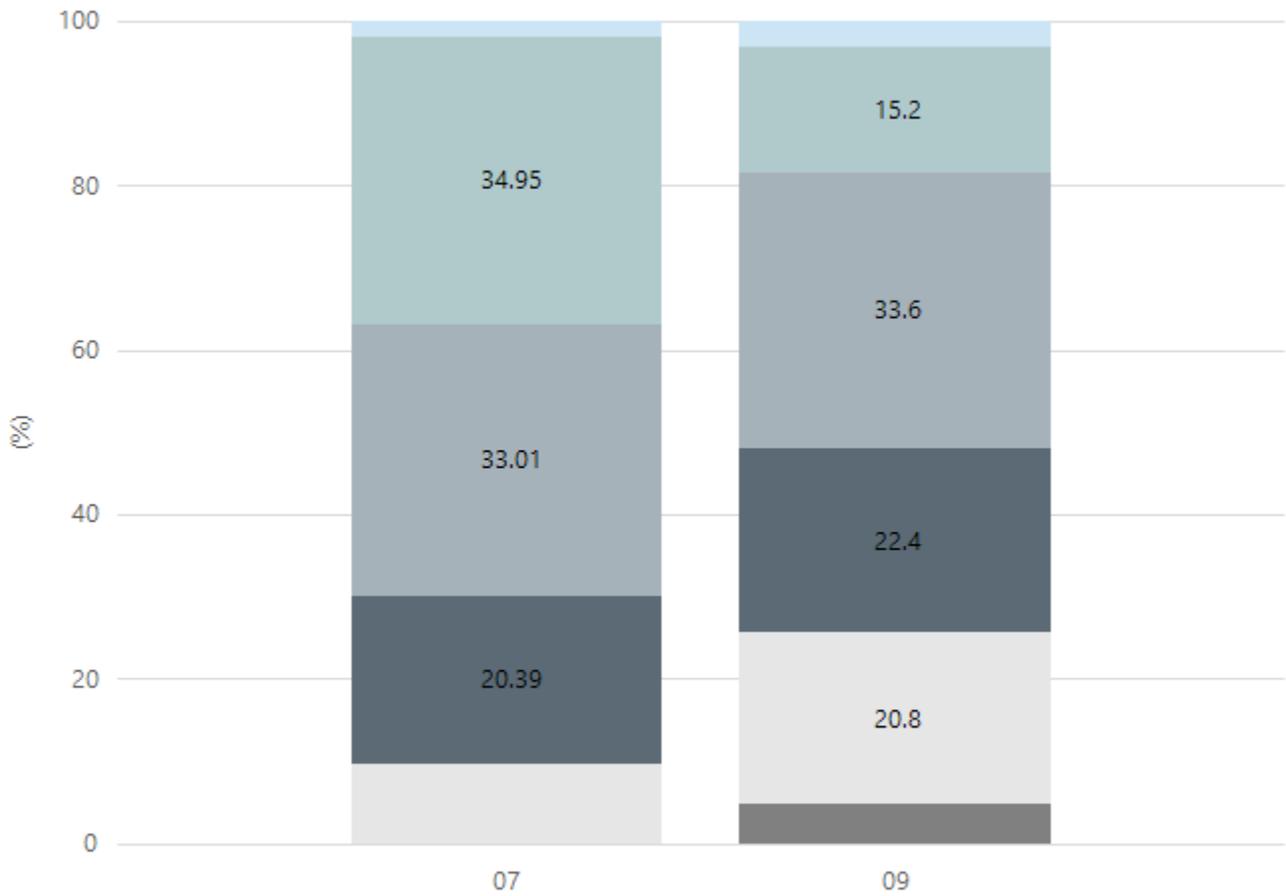

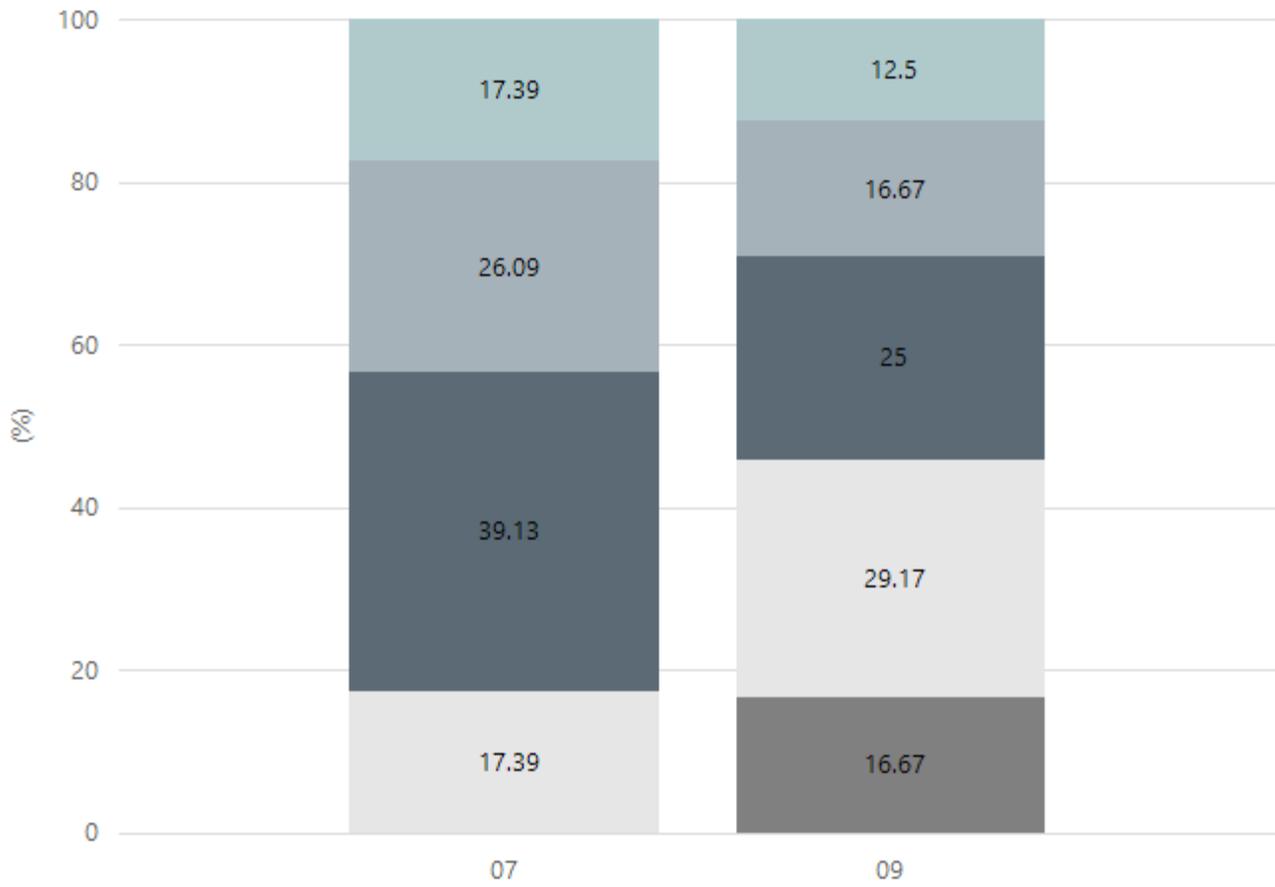

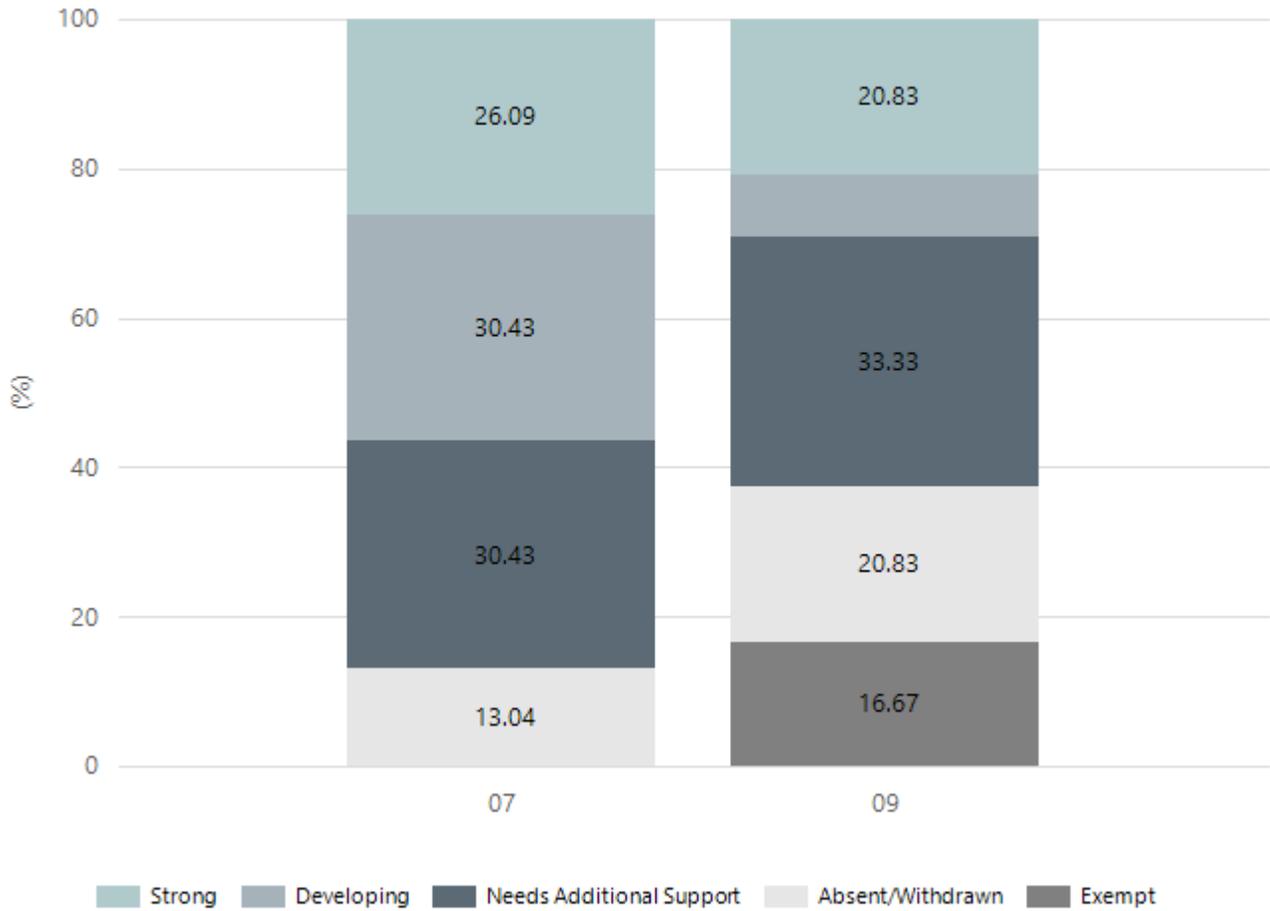

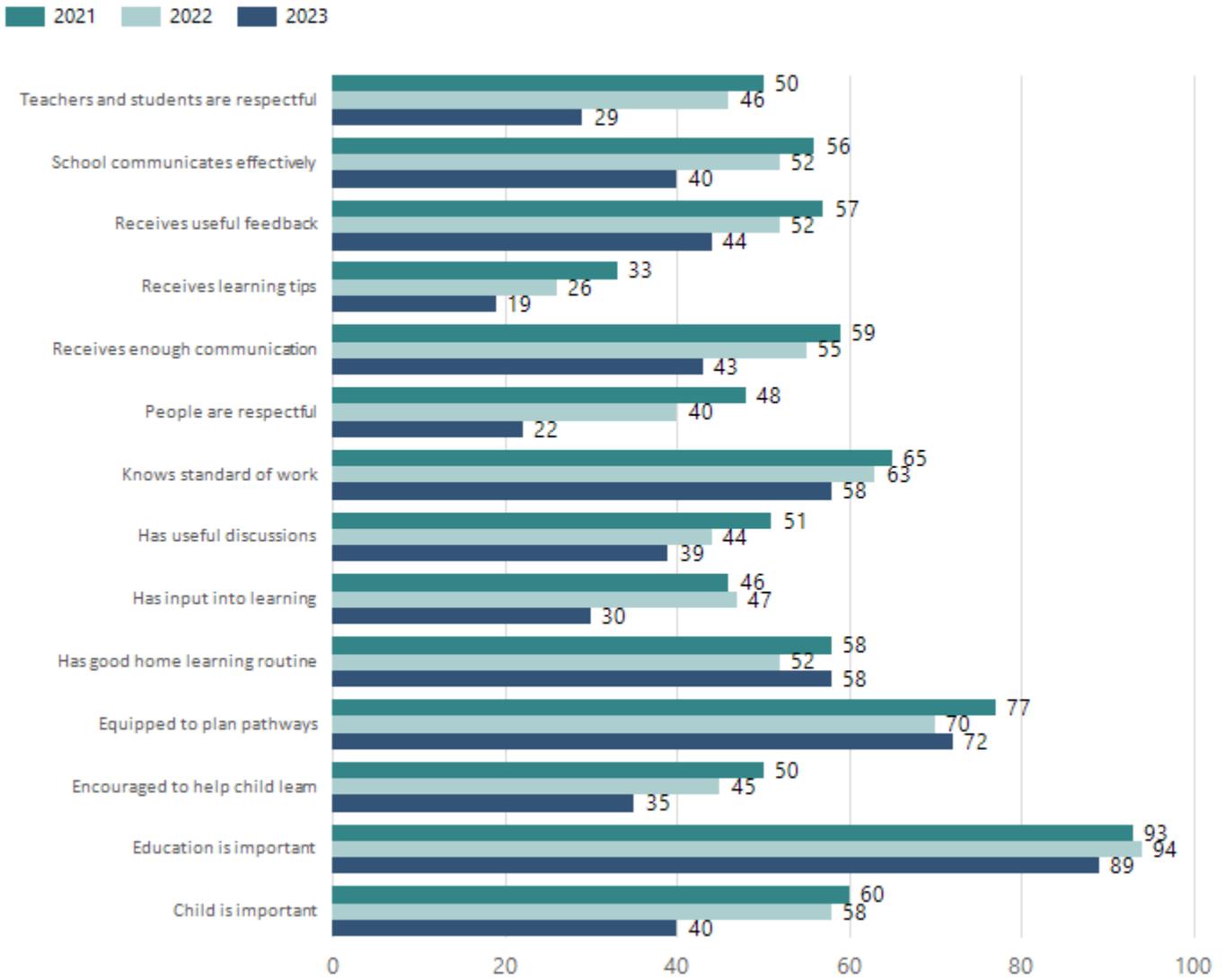

## Attendance Comment

In South Australia, all children and young people must be in school from 6 years to 16 years old. They must attend a government or non-government school full time. From age 16 to 17 however, young people must attend school or an approved learning program (such as an apprenticeship, traineeship, accredited course or university). Schools and parents must encourage and support students to come to school every day. Parents and caregivers must make sure their child is enrolled in a school, and attends school all day and everyday it is open, unless a child is sick or has an approved exemption. Teachers and leaders actively follow up when a student misses school, including recording all absences and non-attendance. All schools in South Australia have local attendance procedures governed under the Education and Children's Services Regulations 2020.

Thank you to all members of the JPSS Governing Council who volunteer their time to contribute to the decision making and support that they offer the school, the school couldn't run without these dedicated volunteers so I encourage new or existing parents of John Pirie Secondary School to be part of the committee and to help shape the future of JPSS. This year saw both John Rohde and Maxine Dienhoff resign from the committee. Maxine has been an integral part of the Governing Council for many years and held a Secretary Role for most of them. Thank you Maxine, for your many years of dedicated service to the Governing Council.

We have had many exciting programs and projects this year at JPSS. John Pirie Secondary School was chosen to be a pilot school for the Clontarf Foundation and it seeks to improve the education, discipline, life skills, self-esteem and employment prospects of young Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander men. It exposes the participants to many experiences, activities, environments, people and opportunities where possible through academic achievement, exciting employment visits, personal milestones or overcoming challenges. The program will commence in 2024 with the guidance of Clontarf Staff and staff at JPSS.

The new Aquaponics program that the Governing Council were invited to tour is a great initiative from staff and students that will be a great addition to the diverse range of programs and projects we offer at the school and have had great assistance in the set-up of the system.

Our Urumbula Gardens are going from strength to strength and are a true testament to our dedicated staff and students. During the year, Urumbula Gardens were invited to be part of the Open SA Gardens Scheme, the only school to have been invited to participate. This was an extremely successful weekend that was made possible by the amazing work of Mr Bruce Mules, JPSS students, Roger Nottage, Karen Rohde and JPSS staff. The feedback from SA Gardens, the public and the tourists that came was extremely positive, a credit to all involved to gain national recognition of such a unique and positive program.

Our other programs that are going from strength to strength are our Dance and Soccer Academies. Some strong results in the Soccer and Dance season and our Dance Academy students also embarking on an excursion to Melbourne to study at a prestigious Melbourne dance academy for some intense training.
