Context Statement

Findon High School caters for students from 7-12. At the time of this report, the enrolment in 2024 is 409. Findon High School is classified as Category 3 on the Department for Education Index of Educational Disadvantage. At the time of this report, the school population includes 13% Aboriginal students, 22% students with disabilities, 12% students with English as an additional language or dialect (EALD) funded background, 1% children/young people in care. Governing Council Report

2024 has been another significant year for Findon High School, continuing our transformation into a leading institution of learning and innovation. With the successful establishment of Findon Technical College and ongoing developments across the school, we are proud to see Findon thrive.

Following the completion of the major Capital Works Program in 2023, 2024 has been a year of consolidation and progress. The Findon Technical College (FTC) is now fully operational, delivering industry-aligned education in state-of-the-art facilities.

We welcomed students in Year 10 and 11 across three industry pathways:

- Advanced Manufacturing and Engineering
- Early Childhood Education and Care
- Health and Social Support

The inaugural students of FTC achieved amazing outcomes in their first year, with 100% completion of their compulsory SACE requirements. A special congratulations to **Hana** who received a merit award for an A+ in Stage 2 Industry Connections. FTC's success is further highlighted by an impressive 98% retention rate into 2025, with 22 students securing active training contracts and nine moving on to university studies in 2025.

In a real highlight, five FTC students in the Advanced Manufacturing and Engineering Stream had the incredible opportunity to participate in the **World Final of the Hydrogen Grand Prix** in Anaheim, California, racing remote-controlled hydrogen-powered cars. Team Thunder placed first in the Australian leg of the race and performed well – and learned a lot – placing 6th in the world rankings. Many thanks to the sponsors for their generosity in making this experience happen.

Our Year 7 enrolment numbers continue to grow, with 54 new students joining Findon High School – an increase of 30% from 2023. Enrolments across all year levels (Years 7–12) have grown by 12%, demonstrating the school's increasing reputation and appeal.

2024 began with the implementation of a new and refreshed timetable designed to support a wider curriculum offering. The carefully crafted Middle School model fosters greater connection across subjects through teams of teachers and integrated projects. Meanwhile, the revised Senior School model provides greater student choice and meaningful pathways. Notably, 2024 saw the first graduating students from our specialist pathway in Creative Industries, with 12 students completing a Certificate III in Screen and Media onsite at Findon.

The curriculum development throughout 2023 has come to life in 2024, with multiple immersion experiences both on and offsite, offering authentic learning opportunities that deepen subject knowledge and inspire new career aspirations.

Acting on parent feedback, staff have worked hard to create more opportunities for families to engage with student learning. Throughout the year, the school hosted multiple events, including:

- Parent information evenings for Year 7 and Senior School
- Acquaintance Night BBQ
- Music Night in Term 2
- Exhibitions of Learning in Term 2
- Learning Conversations and Subject Selection in Term 3
- Arts Extravaganza and Exhibition of Learning, including the first Findon Food Alley (a student-catered food event) in Term 4

We proudly celebrate the achievements of our graduating Class of 2024. Special congratulations to the DUX, Alborz Razaghi, who achieved an outstanding ATAR of **99.95** and will commence studies in **Dentistry at the University of Adelaide** in 2025.

This year also marks a milestone for our First Nations students, with the highest number of graduates in Findon's history. Congratulations to the four students who completed their SACE, and special recognition to **Shyla Wodson**, recipient of the 2024 **Dream Deadly Award**.

A major shift in 2024 has been the adjustment to the school timetable. We appreciate the careful planning and consultation involved in this change and look forward to evaluating its impact on student learning and well-being.

The Governing Council has continued to fulfill its financial and policy responsibilities, ensuring the school operates effectively and sustainably. As Chair, I extend my sincere gratitude to all Council members for their time, effort, and commitment to our school community. We are always looking for new members on Governing Council and I would be very happy to talk with any parent about joining. It is a great way to contribute to your child's schooling.

Looking ahead, we congratulate the **School Captains** elected to lead in 2025: FHS – Lily and Amelie, The Palms – Hediyeh, FTC - Ollie and Taneja. We trust they will lead with passion and integrity, and we wish them a rewarding year ahead.

Finally, on behalf of the Governing Council, I extend our deepest appreciation to the teachers and staff of Findon High School. Your dedication and hard work make a profound difference in the lives of our students, and we are truly grateful for all that you do.

A special thank you to **Principal Kathleen Hoare** for her exceptional leadership and vision. Her unwavering commitment continues to shape Findon into a school of excellence, and we are fortunate to have her at the helm.

Attendance Comment

In South Australia, all children and young people must be in school from 6 years to 16 years old. They must attend a government or nongovernment school full time. From age 16 to 17 however, young people must attend school or an approved learning program (such as an apprenticeship, traineeship, accredited course or university). Schools and parents must encourage and support students to come to school every day. Parents and caregivers must make sure their child is enrolled in a school, and attends school all day and everyday it is open, unless a child is sick or has an approved exemption. Teachers and leaders actively follow up when a student misses school, including recording all absences and non-attendance. All schools in South Australia have local attendance procedures governed under the Education and Children's Services Regulations 2020.
