East Adelaide School is classified as Category 7 on the Department for Education Index of Educational Disadvantage. At the time of this report, the school population includes 1% Aboriginal students, 5% students with disabilities, 6% students with English as an additional language or dialect (EALD) funded background. Money raised from the School Fair and other events during the year helped to fund construction of our new playground in the upper primary yard, which was built to a design chosen by the students. Now this major improvement is completed, the Assets & Landscaping Committee will turn their attention to other projects to improve the school environment.

Out of School Hours Care and Kids' Pantry continue to provide valuable services to our school community, and we are lucky to be able to maintain both operations to a very high standard, when many primary schools may only have one or neither. We thank the staff for their ongoing hard work and commitment and volunteers on both the OSHC Advisory Committee and Canteen Committee for their input.

The Finance Advisory Committee once again played a critical role in ensuring the school, OSHC and Kids' Pantry operated within budget and continue to be financially sustainable.

There has been an increase in participation in after school sports this year, which is great to see and a testament to the effort of the staff involved and the enthusiasm of the After School Sports Committee. A variety of sports and other co-curricular activities continue to be offered to suit the interests and skill levels of students at EAS.

As always, thank you to the EAS teachers and staff for your dedication, expertise and humour in 2025. While it was a massive logistical exercise, a real highlight this year was the Inquiry Showcase in September, where the students displayed their food security projects and demonstrated their learning in very innovative and interesting ways.

Thank you to my fellow members of the 2024 Governing Council and all the parents, family members and friends who have volunteered their time throughout the year for the benefit of our students. With families leaving the school each year as their children move onwards and upwards, we are always looking for new volunteers. It is a great way to feel a closer part of our East Adelaide School community.




# Performance Summary NAPLAN Proficiency









#### **Attendance Comment**

In South Australia, all children and young people must be in school from 6 years to 16 years old. They must attend a government or non-government school full time. From age 16 to 17 however, young people must attend school or an approved learning program (such as an apprenticeship, traineeship, accredited course or university). Schools and parents must encourage and support students to come to school every day. Parents and caregivers must make sure their child is enrolled in a school, and attends school all day and everyday it is open, unless a child is sick or has an approved exemption. Teachers and leaders actively follow up when a student misses school, including recording all absences and non-attendance. All schools in South Australia have local attendance procedures governed under the Education and Children's Services Regulations 2020.
