
Context Statement

Craigmore South Primary School caters for students from R-6. At the time of this report, the enrolment in 2023 is 243. Craigmore South Primary School is classified as Category 2 on the Department for Education Index of Educational Disadvantage. At the time of this report, the school population includes 11% Aboriginal students, 9% students with disabilities, 5% students with English as an additional language or dialect (EALD) funded background, 2% children/young people in care. Performance Summary NAPLAN Proficiency


In 2023, the Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA) - a Commonwealth Independent statutory authority - announced changes to NAPLAN performance reporting. This new way of reporting by ACARA that NAPLAN results from 2023 will not be comparable to previous years. The new approach replaces the previous numerical NAPLAN bands and the national minimum standard.



Attendance Comment

In South Australia, all children and young people must be in school from 6 years to 16 years old. They must attend a government or non-government school full time. From age 16 to 17 however, young people must attend school or an approved learning program (such as an apprenticeship, traineeship, accredited course or university). Schools and parents must encourage and support students to come to school every day. Parents and caregivers must make sure their child is enrolled in a school, and attends school all day and everyday it is open, unless a child is sick or has an approved exemption. Teachers and leaders actively follow up when a student misses school, including recording all absences and non-attendance. All schools in South Australia have local attendance procedures governed under the Education and Children's Services Regulations 2020.

Governing Council Report

2023 was a successful year for Craigmore South Primary School with school processes resuming to normality after the many interruptions from COVID-19. Enrolments are steady with enrolment numbers being slightly up compared to 2022. Collectively, there were 252 enrolments at Craigmore South in 2023. Attendance remained a focus throughout 2023.

With restrictions easing, we have been able to engage more with our wider community, which is something we are aiming to continue building on in 2024.

We were pleased that family members were able to attend our school's Sports Day, End of Year Concert as well as the year 6 graduation ceremony. Thank you to all staff for their planning and resilience to ensure our wider community was able to engage in our special events.

In 2023, our active governing council members helped cover the roles of fundraising committee members for our all-important Mothers and Father's day stalls. Between the two stalls, \$1805.54 was raised. The Craigmore Community Market also donated \$4,280.00 to help support all families to lower costs for excursions and off site events.

Members met as a group twice a term in 2023, on a Monday afternoon prior to the end of the school day.

An OSHC program continues to operate on the school campus providing before and after school care as well as a holiday program. The YMCA, who report to the school council on regular intervals, runs this.

I would like to thank the new members that joined our governing council committee in 2023 and thank our members who have been part of our committee for multiple years.

The council conducted a special cash raffle at the End of Year Concert, which proved to be very successful in raising much-needed funds for the ongoing learning tools required in this day and age. This raffle raised \$1,299.00

The canteen has continued to be very successful throughout 2023 and we would like to thank Miss Fiona and the volunteers for their support in keeping this valuable service running successfully during tough times.

I would like to thank all of our Governing Council members for their hard work and dedication in 2023 and I look forward to seeing both new and familiar faces next year.
