Murputja Anangu School caters for students from R-12. At the time of this report, the enrolment in 2024 is 20. Murputja Anangu School is classified as Category 1 on the Department for Education Index of Educational Disadvantage. At the time of this report, the school population includes 95% Aboriginal students. Governing Council Report

As the Governing Council of Murputja Anangu School, we are pleased to highlight the active involvement and leadership from the Kanpi community in our council, with both the chairperson and vice chairperson elected in May 2024. Their election strengthens the partnership between our school and the wider community. Over the past year, the Governing Council has been dedicated to several key initiatives that contribute to the growth and development of our school and its students. These include:

- **Resource Allocation**: We have allocated funds to revamp the basketball court and are in the process of developing a bus shelter in Kanpi to facilitate morning pick-ups, ensuring smoother transportation for students.
- **Cultural Initiatives**: The Governing Council has been a strong advocate for integrating cultural learning into the school curriculum. We have initiated cultural programs for both students and staff, including sharing and explaining the significance of local song lines. Additionally, we organised excursions to local Tjukurpa sites, fostering a deeper connection to Ngura (Country) and Culture.
- Strengthening Partnerships = Tjungu wakarinyi: We have worked to reinforce the relationship between the school and the Tjungu Palya Arts Centre, further enriching the cultural and artistic opportunities available to our students.
- **Support for Student Excursion**: The Governing Council has supported both intrastate and interstate student excursions, providing students with broader learning opportunities and experiences that contribute to their personal and educational growth.

In terms of governance, work is ongoing in drafting and refining various school documents to ensure a successful succession plan for the years ahead. This includes the careful allocation of budgets to ensure resources are used effectively for the benefit of our school community.

Finally, we would like to reaffirm our strong support for the high expectations set for Aboriginal students, as outlined in the Aboriginal Education Strategy. The Governing Council is committed to upholding these standards and ensuring that every student at Murputja Anangu School has the opportunity to thrive.

We remain committed to our role in guiding the school towards continued success and a bright future for all of our children.

Attendance Comment


In South Australia, preschool attendance is not compulsory, but it is strongly encouraged. Preschool gives children the best opportunity to develop skills, which prepare them for school. These benefits include establishing positive routines and habits, friendships and connections as well as developing communication, problem-solving and creative skills. All children are entitled to access a preschool program over 4 terms the year before they start school.

In South Australia, all children and young people must be in school from 6 years to 16 years old. They must attend a government or non-government school full time. From age 16 to 17 however, young people must attend school or an approved learning program (such as an apprenticeship, traineeship, accredited course or university). Schools and parents must encourage and support students to come to school every day. Parents and caregivers must make sure their child is enrolled in a school, and attends school all day and everyday it is open, unless a child is sick or has an approved exemption. Teachers and leaders actively follow up when a student misses school, including recording all absences and non-attendance. All schools in South Australia have local attendance procedures governed under the Education and Children's Services Regulations 2020.
