Context Statement

Netherby kindergarten is a part-time stand-alone kindergarten located in the Mitcham Council area. The kindergarten is well maintained with large, light filled and natural spaces for the children to explore and learn within. Our families comment regularly on our calm and welcoming environment, reflecting our philosophy and values of 'present, peaceful and purposeful.'

We have an abundance of shady trees, flowering bushes and veggie gardens that the children help tend to. Our nature play is embedded in our program and opportunities are abundant, as we access our Paddock and Bush Garden daily in the cooler months. We are so thankful for our natural setting and the local wildlife. We regularly see ducks with their ducklings, koalas, a variety of birds, and last year we even observed an echidna walking through our garden. On Fridays we run an outdoor playgroup, which families can attend casually and in lead up to transitioning to their kindy enrolment. The playgroup is held for children 0 - 5 years of age and is very popular. We often see 50+ families attend each week. Children attend local Early Learning Centres or Childcare Centres as well as our kindergarten program and go on to attend the local schools in our area.

Governing Council Report

2024 at Netherby Kindy was another year full of incredible connection, development and learning for the students (and the parents alike). The staff did a brilliant job of managing the integration of new cohorts of children and their families at the beginning of semester one and two as the mid-year intake process was in full swing.

Throughout the year different parents/caregivers were invited into the kindy to share their knowledge and support different activities. The children got to climb through an ambulance, learn about their poo and did bush tucker cooking among other things.

The children experienced many incursions to enhance their learning – this included members of the fire department discussing fire safety, Trent Hill, sharing dreamtime stories and Sea Shepherd reps discussing the importance of caring for the environment.

Other learning highlights in 2024 were the winter campfires (a favourite of the children), an excursion to the Urrbrae Wetlands and the introduction and integration of Kaurna language into songs and general vocabulary linked to the natural environment around the kindy. This coincided with the early development of Netherby's reconciliation action plan.

Book week was once again a hive of excitement as the children dressed up as their favourite characters but were clearly outshone by the staff's outfits.

Each weekend, a different family would come up to the kindy and take care of the chickens, which further enhanced the children and their family's connection to this space.

In term 4, Brett and Emily organised a working bee, one Saturday morning, which was great fun as well as productive.

Once again, Netherby Art Show and End of year concert were exciting occasions for the children to share their kindergarten with family and friends.

The art show is the key fundraising event of the year and the governing council (not including me) did a great job of getting donations from businesses in the local area and beyond for the silent auction. People donated wine for the wine wall, which was super successful. The Netherby community was extremely generous and helped raise over \$6000 on that night in 2024. As is the flow of things the money raised one year supports improvements at the kindy the following year. In 2024 the kindy added some new benches and storage for the sandpit as well as a much-needed new swing set.

2024 felt like it took on a theme of growing the children and their family's connection with the beautiful space here and I hope that continues in 2025.

I want to end by acknowledging the quality of the staff at Netherby and the amazing job they do in nurturing our children's natural development, seeing them as individuals and preparing them so well for the realities of mainstream schooling!



Attendance Comment

In South Australia, preschool attendance is not compulsory, but it is strongly encouraged. Preschool gives children the best opportunity to develop skills, which prepare them for school. These benefits include establishing positive routines and habits, friendships and connections as well as developing communication, problem-solving and creative skills. All children are entitled to access a preschool program over 4 terms the year before they start school.


Preschool Family Opinion Survey



Quality of Teaching and Learning




