Governing Council Report

Governing Council Chairperson's Report 2024

2024 at Parks Children's Centre was highlighted by the inclusion of a very diverse group of children who benefited from many accommodations, to ensure they felt a part of their community and were able to access all parts of the program. Most obbiously, a ramp was built at the door to the preschool yard which will remain a valuable asset for the centre moving forward.

We welcomed Rita Li (who remains on staff in 2025) and Leesa Taleporos (who worked in Blue group for the year) in teaching roles and Hannah Toka who provided additional Early Childhood worker support for our very complex cohort.

Sani Zahra joined us last year to lead Occasional Care. The make-up of Occasional Care has been adapted to meet the needs of the community which is increasingly bringing us younger children to

In term 4, Margot Hogben took extended leave and her Occupational therapy role is being covered by Aishah Abdullah.

Staffing at the centre remains very stable with many educators enjoying long tenure at Park

Governing Council has given approval for redevelopment of the Mud Kitchen and purchase of an interactive whiteboard in 2025.

Flooding and plumbing issues from 2022 and previously have been recognised by the Department for Education as being too complex and expensive for our site to manage and we were given an undertaking that an investigation of the roofing and pipes would be conducted and infrastructure repairs would be conducted and funded departmentally. This work is underway and will continue in 2025.

Enrolments at the end of 2024 were not as high as expected but as the preschool's cap remains the

Highlights of the year included trips to Gorge Wildlife Reserve for both preschool groups and visits from Bugs and Slugs, Old MacDonald's Farm and a fire engine and emergency crew.

In term 4 Suzanne Dawson confirmed she would not be returning to Parks and Felicia Rasheed, who had been acting in the director's role in 2024, won the role for 5 years in a panel process that included Governing Council representation.

It was a pleasure to support the centre alongside the other governing council members. We wish the staff, children and families all the best moving forward.

All children are entitled to access a preschool program over 4 terms the year before they start school.
