#### 2023 Chairperson's Report

#### Read at the 2024 AGM on 14th Feb 2024.

In 2023, Gladigau Park Kindergarten welcomed two new teachers – Kate Ellis and Monique Maney, Angelia having left at the end of 2022 to pursue primary school teaching. Monique moved to Naracoorte North Kindy in Term 2, which gave Kate a full-time position at Gladigau for the rest of 2023. Louise was Acting Director during Term 1, until Jane returned to take over the Director's role from Term 2 onwards. Alisha lost support hours in 2023 and went to one day a week, covering play group and 3 hours of support.

Governing Council held three fundraisers, receiving generous donations for our Fathers' Day Raffle and a successful Two Bros cookie dough fundraiser. Our third fundraising attempt – Picture Plates – received fewer participants than usual, potentially due to the rising cost of living.

Staff facilitated many wonderful excursions, which included trips to the Post Office, the Mount Gambier Public Library for Simultaneous Storytime, the Riddoch Arts and Cultural Centre to view the mural the children had worked together to create, and Echo Farm. All were met with much enthusiasm and excitement.

Speech pathologists were outsourced for two children, and the staff-led Circle of Security program was welcomed again by many grateful parents.

2023 saw the implementation of mid-year intakes, who were all made very welcome. The kindy website was also upgraded.

The kindy saw a few challenges towards the end of the year, with a couple of incidents of Industrial Action and an incident of social media negativity, which Jane handled expertly and in a timely manner.

The children heading off to school in 2024 enjoyed visits to their new schools, and also received visits at the kindy from their teachers-to-be. Hopefully this made all transitions as smooth as possible.

On behalf of members of the Governing Council, I would like to thank Jane, Louise, Kate and all staff for such a warm welcome to the kindy, and a very successful year for all. I look forward to returning in 2024.


## **Attendance Comment**

In South Australia, preschool attendance is not compulsory, but it is strongly encouraged. Preschool gives children the best opportunity to develop skills, which prepare them for school. These benefits include establishing positive routines and habits, friendships and connections as well as developing communication, problem-solving and creative skills. All children are entitled to access a preschool program over 4 terms the year before they start school.

## Quality of Teaching and Learning


#### Proportion of agree/strongly agree responses (%)

## Support of Learning


#### Proportion of agree/strongly agree responses (%)

## Relationships and Communication


#### Proportion of agree/strongly agree responses (%)
