#### **Attendance Comment**




#### Proportion of agree/strongly agree responses (%)


Proportion of agree/strongly agree responses (%)

#### **YCCC Governing Council Chairperson's Report 2023**

The YCCC Governing Council has been busy in 2023. The membership of the council was made up of a large group of parents and the Director, who met twice a term during 2023. In Term 1 we farewelled our Director Jill Huntley as she began retirement and we successfully recruited for the position. In Term 2 we welcomed Lisa Vermeeren as our new Director.

The GC and Director Lisa reviewed the annual budget half way through the year as it was forecast to be a loss. We suggested changes to the way consumables such as craft supplies were used in the centre and promoted using recycled materials donated by staff and parents to reduce costs. Thanks to Lisa for working hard to bring the budget back to a positive figure.

The GC has also updated and approved numerous policies and procedures in 2023. This included the Managing Medical Conditions, Catastrophic Bushfire Day, Safe Sleeping, Nappy Changes and the Healthy Food policies.

A big focus for the GC this year has been the completion of the new bike track 'Charlie's Track'. The idea for a bike track in the yard was generated a few years ago and it was pleasing to see it finally completed in December. The concept to name the track in memory and honour of past YCCC student Charlie Hoile was well received by Charlie's parents and the wider community. This project has involved a lot of fundraising to reach our target of \$10,000, which we surpassed to \$13,000. A significant part of this funding (\$5,000) came from successfully applying for the SA Power Networks Community Grants Program in June.

The GC successfully held two working bees during the year, to spread new soft fall around the yard and landscape around the new bike track. Items in need of repair or removal due to safety concerns have also been identified in the yard, such as fences and play equipment. This will be an important task for the GC to work on in 2024.

Thank you to all the parents on the GC this year and also to Lisa who has had a busy transition to Director of YCCC.
